Serving local families in need since 1981, Feeding America West Michigan reclaims millions of meals' worth of safe, surplus food from various sources. With the help of countless volunteers, the food bank sorts, stores and distributes this food through a network of hundreds of hunger-relief partners to fill neighbors' plates instead of landfills. The food bank's service area consists of 40 of Michigan's 83 counties from the Indiana border north through the Upper Peninsula.

MANNUAL REPORT







ACCOMPLISHMENTS

As your local food bank, we collaborated with our community this past year in the work to fight hunger in 40 counties in West Michigan and the Upper Peninsula.

By working together in 2023, we distributed 28,097,677 pounds of food, which equates to 23,414,730 meals, to 1,188,296 households. This food was provided through:



21 Gather 2 Grow sites, which offered lunches during the summertime to youth and developmentally delayed adults. These lunches were distributed in partnership with local libraries in five different counties: Allegan, Ionia, Kent, Muskegon and Newaygo. Eight nutritious, shelf-stable meal options such as meat and cheese, chicken bites, bean dip and more were provided. There were vegetarian and nut-free options as well, and each lunch contained five to six items per kit.

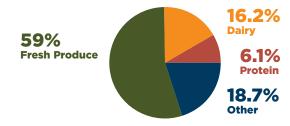
This program ran from June to August for 10 weeks and served 27,518 meals to youth in need.

Gather 2 Grow helps fill the summer meal gap for kids. During the school year, many kids rely on free or reduced-price breakfast and lunch, as well as weekend or evening meal programs. When school ends, most of these resources suddenly disappear, and that's where this program steps in.





1,582 Mobile Food Pantries hosted by 170 partners, which provided supplemental groceries to neighbors in need in 31 counties. 8.8 million meals were served to 695,181 individuals, with a 27.6% increase in participation when compared to 2022. On average, the product mix on Mobile Pantries included:

92 youth programs, including backpack programs—which sent kids home from school with food items such as granola bars, fruit cups, crackers, beef sticks and cheese sticks—summer camps, snack programs and other programs dedicated to serving children.

Many youth programs exist to fill the meal gap many children face, whether it be in the evenings, weekends during the school year or summer break. Kids need to focus on education, development and playing; they shouldn't be distracted by feeling hungry.



38 meal programs, which served a variety of prepared foods to seniors and other community members.

Food is often a reason for people to gather together, but when you're facing food insecurity it can be difficult to show up with a dish to pass when you're already having trouble putting food on your own table. Meal programs across our service area provide a space for people to come as they are and be in community while enjoying a nourishing meal.



493 partner food pantries and other programs, which nourished neighbors facing hunger in a range of ways.

"We have a lot of people that come once, because everything hit the fan, but then we never see them again. And then we have people who come over and over and a lot of them are older, and their pensions have not kept up.
